

Principal's Report

n view of the social unrest and the coronavirus outbreak, we underwent an extended school suspension leading to massive rescheduling and cancellation of events. Working in unity with unfailing support from teachers, support staff and parents, we were glad to have a smooth transition and managed to wrap up with a fulfilling school year.



Leveraged on the solid foundation of the determination and collaborative effort of the YHKCC members, our school is experiencing stable growth and development, transforming into a better us with recognized achievements throughout the years. At our 10th Anniversary in 2013, the Music Block and promenade areas were constructed; at our 15th Anniversary in 2018, we were honoured to receive 10 million donation from YMCA of Hong Kong to build a new Black Box Theatre "Trinity Hall" which was put in service in September, 2019. The newly built theater provided a well-equipped venue to develop and discover the talent and potential of students and also provided an ideal arena for performance appreciation in school as well as by the community. In 2019-2020, based on the strong Christian belief and guided by our core values, we sustain steady enhancement and improvement in various aspects to strive for excellence. New records set, breakthroughs of personal limit, persistence during difficulties, etc. I am grateful to see all these, showing great determination and passion in achieving flying colours.

This year, we continued to uphold the CARES principles and fully put the YHKCC Learner Profile into effect to enhance teaching and learning effectiveness. We further streamlined and strengthened the IT systems to facilitate teaching and learning through the "One student One notebook" scheme, starting from El. This initiative made learning and teaching more connected and interactive, equipping students to be 21st century ready. Another great leap was the use of the SEQTA to replace the VLE system. With the use of SEQTA, rollcall, e-learning, assignments and parent-school communication are all at our fingertips. It helps all our stakeholders get first



hand, transparent information to sustain good cooperation and communication.

To promote a balanced and holistic development of young people, the school has continued to strengthen the Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) programme by granting a special theme for each year group to provide a variety of workshops, seminars and support throughout the year. The themes for each year group are as follows:

Form I: "Be a BEAR (Be organized, Engage in learning, Ask for help if you need it, Be respectful to yourself and others) for Success"

Form 2: "We Choose Our Own Opportunities"

Form 3: "The struggle you're in today is developing the strength you need for tomorrow"

Form 4: "You are all capable of amazing things"

Form 5: "Preparing today for a brighter future"

Form 6: "Learn from yesterday, live for today, hope for tomorrow"

The PSHE programme fosters a more caring environment, providing emotional support for students and facilitating more healthy living.

We are dedicated to building a closer bond with the local community, and we place great importance on developing personal and social responsibility through our extensive service outreach programmes and community service opportunities. Jointly organized with OlWA, the YHKCC-OlWA Elderly Academy was set up to provide more learning platforms for the elderly. This programme aims to enable the elderly to pursue a healthy and active retirement, promoting lifelong learning and inter-generational harmony in a school setting. Students were nominated as the Steering Committee to actively participate in the meaningful voluntary work of the Academy.

Last, but not least, the school has endeavoured to further strengthen and build productive partnerships and connections with parents and students. We believe that transparent, effective home-school communication is pivotal for the positive development of students. In the years ahead, we will continue to be a good listener and a democratic community which cares for the aspirations of all of our stakeholders.

As mentioned, 2019-2020 has been a challenging year, but our students have been working with great perseverance and determination in order to scale new heights and leap over new hurdles and challenges throughout the year. It has been truly gratifying to witness the hard work and conscientious effort all members of the community have put into the achievements you can see in this Yearbook, and I am delighted to share them with you.

Academic Achievements

Thanks to the effective implementation of the new Academic Structure and timetable three years ago, I am pleased to report fruitful results in the public examination results for both local and international streams.

For the Hong Kong Stream, 16 subjects performed better than those of last year in terms of passing rate (level 2) and level 4 or above. Some subjects continuously performed better than the Hong Kong norm in their passing rates (level 2) and level 4 or above. These subjects include: Economics (100%), English Language (100%, level 4 or above 71.9%), ICT (100%), Liberal Studies (95.2%), Literature in English (100%), Mathematics (M2) (100%, level 4 or above 100%), Physical Education (100%), Spanish Language (100%, Grade A 100%), THS (87.5%) and Visual Arts (level 4 or above - 28.6%). Namakkal Raghavendran Srinivas (6Y) was the outstanding achiever this year with two 5* in English Language and Mathematics (Algebra and Calculus) and three L5 in Mathematics, Chemistry and Physics respectively, L4 in Liberal Studies and A in Spanish. Other top performers include Navrose Singh (6Y), Mohideen Yusuf (6C), Tiffany Ha (6Y), Yuen Sheung Man (6Y), Nauman (6C). They all got impressive results in the HKDSE examination.

The results for the International Stream were distinctive, with a passing rate of 96%. An impressive 25% of all grades were A* or A. Even more remarkable is the fact that over 67% of the grades were in the A* to C range. Art & Design, Business, Drama & Theatre Studies, French, Geography, History, Physics and Religious Studies all had a 100% passing rate. The top performers were Cheung Hoi Yan (6H) and Cheung Hoi Kei (6H) who both achieved straight A with four and three A*s respectively. Chuange Cheng Yu (6H) also produced top-notch performances.

These outstanding accomplishments earned offers from both local and overseas universities, including the Hong Kong University of Science & Technology (HKUST), The University of Hong Kong, The Chinese University of Hong Kong, City University of Hong Kong, Hong Kong Baptist University, King's College London (UK), University of East Anglia (UK), University of Manchester (UK), University of Queensland (Australia), University of Newcastle (Australia), University of Waterloo (Canada), Oral Roberts University (USA), University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee (USA), University of Navarra (Spain), Wageningen University and Research (The Netherlands) to name a few.

In addition, some of our students were honoured the "Cambridge Learner Award" by the Cambridge Assessment International Education for their distinctive academic achievements

These amazing results are the result of an incredibly positive attitude towards learning, an insatiable thirst for knowledge and an enormous amount of persistence, effort and determination.

Recognition of outstanding academic attainments also came from the award of scholarship and prizes. Cheung Chockle (6H), Verreault Amelie (6H) won the Gold Award whereas Nouman Khan (6H), Samson Diane Isabelle Tianhong (6K) and Balbona Natalie Elizabeth Campbell attained the Silver Award in the Intermediate Biology Olympiad. Good news also came from the International Biology Olympiad Hong Kong Contest. Chockle Cheung (6H) brought home the Gold Award, Amelie Verreault awarded the Outstanding Student Performance Award and Yamauchi Kahori (5H) claimed the Honourable Mention Award. Another remarkable accomplishment worth noting is Shruti Kaur's (4A) winning the merit prize for the prestigious writing competition "Love is All Around".

Our school's diverse cultural composition, with over 70 percent of students coming from more than 40 countries over the globe, is one of our distinctive features. Learning and growing in this multicultural environment enriches learning experiences and we are committed to making further connections with both local and overseas schools and universities as well as introducing new opportunities to broaden students' exposure and experiences. To put words into action, the school arranged various exchange programmes and visits for teachers and students with the following organizations or sister schools:

International Exposure

In Summer 2019, five YHKCC students together with students from Marymount Secondary School and St. Joseph's College participated in a joint-school educational programme in St. Denis International School, France to study French for a total of thirty hours. The 3-week trip provided an authentic learning opportunity outside the classroom. Contact with locals and exposure to students from a great diversity of nationalities enabled them to have a better understanding of French culture, enlarge their social circle and most importantly to practice and apply the target language in a local setting which in return, raised their language proficiency as well as polished their communication skills. Experiential learning is one of the most effective ways to learn a foreign language and it is definitely a valuable learning experience.









Student Development and Student Achievements

It was a tough year with multiple tournaments cancelled due to the Covid-19 outbreak. However, our sports team attained remarkable achievements in season I, including numerous trophies and new records. The Athletic and Cross-country, Fencing, Rugby, Football, Swimming, Table-tennis, Volleyball and Taekwondo Teams were victorious in prominent interschool tournaments.

The Rugby Team capped off a successful New Territories campaign for our A Grade Girls, winning the champion for the third year in a row in the All Hong Kong Rugby Sevens while the A Grade Boys was crowned the Champion in the HKSSF Inter-Schools Rugby Sevens Competition (All NT Regions).


The Football Team continued to thrive this year with the Youth UI3 and Junior UI5 Teams being the champions in the Islands District Mini-Soccer Competition, organized by the Leisure and Cultural Service Department in association with the Islands District Sports Association. The UI4 Boys team shared more success in the Silver Division of the International School Sports Federation Hong Kong (ISSFHK). The teams comprised A and B team to compete in the tournaments of different divisions. UI4 Team B successfully made the 1st runner up in the Silver Division 2 for their first time while Team A did even better and secured the champion in the Silver Division I.

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The Swimming Team performed exceptionally well this year with 64 medals and overall trophies for Boys and Girls Team. The Boys Team claimed the overall champion title second year in a row whereas the Girls Team were the 5th champion queen in the HKSSF Inter-schools Swimming Championships. The results were distinctive: The Girls were the Champion across the board (A, B & C Grades), the A & B Grade Boys were the Champion and the C Grade Boys were 2nd Runners-up. Caitlin Hobson (3H) set a new record in the Inter-school C Grade Girls 200m Individual Medley and 50m butterfly. Great results also came from the ISSFHK Swimming Championship (Season I). The team brought home I silver and 2 bronze medals home with great delight.



The Athletics and Cross-Country Teams obtained more than 30 medals and trophies in various track and field events and set new records. The team was with good sportsmanship and performed well in the HKSSF Inter-school Athletics Championships. The A & C Grade Girls were 2nd Runner-up and 1st Runner-up respectively for the overall trophies while the A Grade Boys came up with the 3rd Runner-up. Yan Rachel Sin Yen (6K) set a new record in the A Grade Girls Short Put in the Tusen Wan & Island District.







The Taekwondo Team achieved striking results in both local and international arenas. The team brought home 7 gold, 3 silver and I bronze medals in the categories of Individual Poomsae and Sparring respectively in the 70th Anniversary of the National Day Taekwondo Championship. The masterful skills not only showed by the entire team, Tammy Lau Tsz Wan (2M) demonstrated excellent determination for winning the champion in the in the I2-I4 aged Colour Belt Group of the Hong Kong Ladies Taekwondo Competition. All these achievements were very impressive.

The Fencing Team attained their first victory with a bronze medal in the U2O Boys of the in the ISSFHK Fencing Championship (Season I). This great leap is encouraging news and bodes well for upcoming tournaments.

The Volleyball Team achieved very encouraging results in the ISSFHK Volleyball Competition (Season I), coming 1st Runner-up in the U2O Girls (Silver Division) and the Tabletennis Team continued to improve and got the 3rd Runner up in the A Grade Boys HKSSF Inter-Schools Table Tennis Championships.

In addition to the team awards, there were lots of great individual performances by our athletes, including Lucas Ng (IH) who represented the Hong



Kong Team and battled the champion in the China Friendship Lacrosse Competition. He was also awarded the MVP in one of the match in the tournament. Honour also went to Jasmine Kaur (5K), Kuljit Dhillon (5Y), Gill SImranjit Kaur (5C), Palakjot Walia (4H) and our alumnus Nimratpal Kaur on winning the 1st Runner up in the Bhangra Competition organized by Caritas and Lok Naach Society. It was the first time that this folk dance competition of the Punjab had taken place in Hong Kong. Our alumni are always one of our most valuable assets, contributing substantially to the success of the YHKCC. Andrea Maria Lagoman Parungao represented the Philippines Ladies' National Hockey Team and obtained the bronze medal in the 2019 Southeast Asian Games.



Apart from the sports teams, Shruti Kaur (4A) entered the The Hong Kong 71st English Speech Festival and was crowned first in Solo Public Speaking. Her talent extends to her skills as a writer, as the merit prize was awarded for her writing piece in the "Love is All Around" Writing Competition.

I take such great delight to see all these great accomplishments and truly value the unfailing, assiduous endeavours of students and sedulous contribution and proactive

Community Service and Life-wide Learning Camp

The purpose is to develop a deep sense of personal responsibility and dedication to fostering social welfare. Service Outreach and Community Service were our primary projects since the establishment of the school. Unfortunately, due to the Covid-19 outbreak, the Service Outreach Programme 2019 (SOW) has been suspended. However, our passion and commitment has never subsided. The Community Service Club is dedicated to participating in a wide range of local service programmes ranging from visiting elderly homes, giving out goodie bags for the underprivileged, flag-selling, and also to be the Steering Committee of the YHKCC-OIWA Elder Academy to help out with the administrative work as well as the coordination of activities for the senior citizens. Heartfelt appreciation should be given to all of our partners who lined up these meaningful programmes for students.

School Events

We believe that rich and diverse experiences are gained from practical involvement in activities, and a strong sense of



belonging is derived from a harmonious, stimulating learning environment. To uphold this philosophy, we are committed to organizing a wide range of activities over the course of the year.

Although the annual highlight event, International Fun Fair, was cancelled due to the social movement this year, the passion and enthusiasm of our students has never diminished. Students practiced in full gear for each step and turn for their dance performances featuring different cultures and counties around the globe at the Year-end Talent Show and Christmas Parade. The fantastic performances demonstrated the talents and potential of the students and impressed all attending quests.



To further spread the messages of "Serve one another" and "Build a community that cares", we are devoted to bringing love and care to the needy in the community. To this end the school joined hands with OIWA to set up the YHKCC-OIWA Elderly Academy with the objective to provide a series of platforms for the senior citizens to pursue a health and active lifelong learning after retirement and fostered intergenerational harmony in the school setting. An inauguration ceremony was hosted on 7th December, with full house attended with the elderly, guests, teachers and students. An expression of love and support was sent out in the form of the distribution of 2.50 goodies bags. It was a blessing morning and heartfelt gratitude should be given to all the sponsors for the donated items of the goodies bags, making the event an unprecedented success.

Back to School Night for parents and junior forms, Parent-Teacher Conferences, Information Evenings, Options Evenings and Curriculum Briefings were all well attended by parents. At the Graduation Ceremony and College Night, certificates and prizes were presented to our students in recognition of their outstanding academic and non-academic achievements. This year we had 60 and 57 graduates from the HKDSE and GCE A-level streams respectively.

School Visits and Highlights

School Visit by Elite Education,

Xin Qiang (China)

group of 13 educators from Elite Education, Xin Qiang, China visited our school on 22nd November, 2019. The objectives of the visit were to get a better understanding about the differences of the education system between Hong Kong and China as well as make a stronger connection among schools to foster the alliance of sister schools in the upcoming future.

Students spent a meaningful and precious time in understanding more about the local community through these various local service trips. We sincerely hope all students are able to show their kindness and empathy to everyone around them, and carry on showing a caring heart in their daily lives.



Last but not least, we appreciate our Principal Dion Chen who gave us a lot of support and granted us an opportunity to learn aboard. Thanks YHKCC!














Parent-Teacher Conference


World Book Week


fun rekindling our love for words and stories. Thank you to everyone who took part!


Sharings from Authors

Online Learning



V. Additional Support for Public Examination Classes

or the music curriculum across all levels, there are three core skills to focus on: music listening, performing and composing. In each form, various activities are planned with increasing challenges to gradually enable students to achieve great musicianship.

By the end of Form I, students would have learned the criteria of good performance and experienced performing in front of an audience. They would also have learned basic music theory in notes and rhythm and composed simple melodies. By the end of Form 2, students would have learned how to play a piece on keyboard. In addition, they would have composed a song based on chords. Throughout the courses, music

IGCSE Music courses in Form 3 and 4 further provide intensive training to become a sophisticated musician. Creative Arts Week with a different cultural theme each year, activities held before such as the "school of band" and karaoke challenge. Unfortunately, we have to wait for next

academic year for these functions due to the school suspension. The annual Music Contest is also a popular event, which is documented in another section of the Yearbook.

Lastly, music ECAs with teamwork and coaching from professional musicians provide valuable opportunities for long-term development. 



Should the concept of zoos be nullified?

oos are an establishments which maintain a collection of wild animals, typically in a park or gardens, for study, conservation, or display to the public. The very first zoo was made by Queen Hatshepsut in 1500 B.C. in Equpt by collecting animals from all over Africa. However, the oldest currently operating zoo is Tiergarten Schönbrunn/Vienna Zoo in Vienna, Austria. It was founded as an imperial menagerie in 1752. Even though zoos have been present with us for more than a few centuries, there are problems that come along with them. Zoos bring a lot of harm to animals, mentally and physically. Some animals such as elephants are sometimes brought to small enclosures that do not meet their needs. Other animals that need hibernation or migration cannot do as their instincts tell them to. The increasing popularity of zoos is due to the fact that the public is not shown the true brutality to animals behind the scenes. Despite the way some zoos might treat animals, others focus on the wellbeing and the survival of other species. This essay will explore why the concept of zoos should be nullified for once and for all with focus on what would happen if the animals were released in the wild, how they are treated in enclosures away from the media, and what are the effects of long term exposure to the environments in zoos.

The biggest reason the idea of zoos should be cancelled out is euthanization of animals. Animals are living beings whose fates should not be dependent on our problems, they shouldn't have to be put down like a measly insect or be sold to another zoo-like another cargo shipment. "The idea that some lives matter less is the root of all that is wrong with the world." The main cause of this is the lack of space in zoos for extra animals or

lack of money to take care of them. If zoos can't take care of them properly then they shouldn't have bought them in the first place. Each year in Europe alone, about 10,000 animals are killed with infinite excuses from zoo authorities. Visitors to zoos turn their head to this type of activity, they know what is happening but they push it to the back of their mind trying to convince themselves everything is fine to stop feeling guilty for not trying to do anything to help the animals.

Living in zoos for a long period of time can also lead to altered animal behaviour. This is mainly caused because animals such as bears and birds have to resist their natural instinct to hibernation or migrate. This can lead to aggressive behaviour which can make them a threat to humans and animals close by. Some might believe it is inhumane to reject animals to act upon their natural instinct and needs. The animals are treated like prisoners - are fed at a specific time, taken out of their cages at a certain time, controlled and have no choice in any matters whatsoever.

Unfortunately, some zoos are even bigger threats to the animals living inside than others. For some Profit-Only zoos, conservation and breeding programs to save the world's most endangered species are nothing more than marketing tactics to bring customers tumbling through their doors. Although many zoos have a mission statement that lives up to the ethnic and moral claims that most people would agree on, behind the scenes, little is done to prove they are putting effort in this mission. Customers are trapped in the well-thought plans of people who would do anything to earn a profit.

With cons comes pros. Zoos also have benefits that help the animal kingdom flourish. One of those benefits is halting extinction events. If a species were on the verge of

extinction or endangered, it would be highly unlikely that they would be able to find each other to mate. Zoos do their best to help with this problem. They slow down the extinction and try to increase their population by breeding programmes via regulated breeding in zoos and other approved facilities as well as reintroduction programs for animals that have been extinct in the wild. They have helped save more than 6 species from extinction. If it weren't for their hard work and dedication, species such as Golden Lion Tamarin and Puerto Rican Parrot would have been long gone. However, even though some zoos do try their best to help animals, the cons overweigh the pros. As Alice Walker, the writer of the novel 'The Colour Purple' once said, "The animals of the world exist for their own reasons. They were not made for humans any more than black people were made for white, or women created for men."

Currently, with COVID-19 spreading around the world, people are being told to selfisolate. We are being advised to stay at home and avoid contact with people. This is making many people annoyed, cranky and angry. Our current way of living is not much different than the way animals live for their entire life in zoos. In fact, if we want to go out every once in a while to get some fresh air, we are able to do so. However, the animals living in zoos don't have a choice, they are being forced to live their life the way we want them to. If in just 2-3 month we are fed up of staying in an isolated area, imagine how animals feel when they take their first breath in a cage and take their last one in the very same place, forever stuck in an endless loop of trying to hold on to their sanity. I'd say their aggression and hatred toward humans is completely valid. In conclusion, the concept of zoos should be nullified.




groundbreaking booked called 'The Golden Bough', which is a guide through the underworld of ancient religions that existed before Christianity. His work



Some Factors that have Caused Poverty in Hong Kong

ne of the major factors is from the political perspective regarding the free market. In a free market economy, the government is not able to take part in the procedures of people earning money. Hence, certain members of society will not be able to work, such as the elderly, children, or others who are unemployed because their skills are not marketable. In other words, they will not be able to earn money effectively. They will be left behind by the economy at large and, without any income, will fall into poverty. Those who remain jobless would have to take up labor intensive jobs or perform scavenging in order to survive in the world. Moreover, due to the free market, there is no way that these individuals can be helped in any systematic manner. The result is that income inequality takes root where they are not able to pay their medical bills, get enough food, access basic shelter, and so on. This shows that the free market leads to income inequality.

Another prominent factor is the personal factor regarding low education. In other words, it refers to those who could not afford education or who could not have a chance to be educated. Most of the time it relates to intergenerational poverty. Due to low knowledge of the subject material, it decreases their chance to have a good reputed office job. Simply put, they would need to perform in the secondary sector of labor intensive jobs. They would have to put more effort and dedication in the work but would receive three times less of the hard work they have put into it. It means that their wage would be generally low leading to low disposable income. Thus, low savings for the future. When they grow older, they would not have enough savings to support themselves. This leads to poverty. This shows that they would have to continue to work hard in their old age as well that could harm their physical body yet, they have no other recourse to it. This shows that low education could lead to poverty.

A salient factor is the economical factor regarding unorganized economic structure. When the structure of the economy is unstable, it could lead to many negative impacts. This often occurs in the low economically developed countries. Citizens living in those countries are in a state of social mobility. They cannot come up the social ladder. Often, they need to work in factories where the environment is harsh and the working hours are astonishing very long. Yet, the wage they earn is less than the amount needed for survival. They have an unfair distribution of wage and aren't able to earn a lot. The working environment is usually dangerous. If a person requires medical healthcare, this wouldn't be possible as they cannot afford to do so. Transnational companies earn the most even though their workload is the least. It shows that a lack of proper economical structure could lead to a lot of unfairness and income inequality.

Do you think the development of country parks help to alleviate the current housing problem in Hong Kong?

o a large extent, I believe that developing country parks help to relieve the current housing problem. The advantages outweigh its harms.

Firstly, through urbanizing country parks, the housing policy provides affordable housing for incapable citizens. According to an article from South China Morning Post, the housing department plans to accommodate more than 25,200 people by 2026. The Housing Authority has already received 151,900 applications from families for public rental housing and about 108,500 applications for flats from single people. From turning country parks into housing estates, many more needs will be compensated. This proves that the quality of life of citizens is increasing due to the number of affordable flats being built. Therefore, the policy compensates for those who cannot afford flats in developed areas.

Another reason is that the policy creates more space to prevent overpopulation. There are a couple of industrial areas in Hong Kong filled with public housing estates such as Tsueng Kwan O, Shek Kip Mei and Sha Tin. Researchers conclude that about 44.7% are under the public housing policy, which is around 3.3 million of the population in Hong Kong. By developing country parks and transforming them into housing, more residents will be located in different estates rather than just crowded in one housing area. This highlights the improvement in sanitation and the sense of belonging for each and every citizen, raising their quality of life as well. Thus, developing country parks avoid a sudden boom in population at just one specific housing estate.

Some may object that even if the public housing policy alleviates the housing problem, there are many more environmental concerns.

Not only will the species be endangered and extinct but also there will be a lack of natural scenery. With reference to an article from South China Morning Post on developing country parks, officials are already eyeing two famous country parks, Ma On Shan Country Park and Tai Lam Country Park. This is known to be one of the most famous hiking trails in Hong Kong, especially for elders. Apart from contradicting the environmental concerns, it damages the homes and habitats of the animals and lessens leisure activity for other older residents. Hence, developing country parks would affect the environment significantly and also would not compensate for the needs of the entire public.

However, I disagree with the argument above as the policy allows everyone to gain equal rights in terms of housing and service. Even if all the needs of older residents may not be

compensated, each and everyone acquires various facilities such as shopping malls, clinics and parks, which is shared amongst all residents. The policy permits all residents to gain an adequate standard of living, a better quality of life. If the government develops country parks, not only will there be more affordable housing but also more services

provided for residents. With that being said, the policy relieves the current housing problem because it eliminates inequality and provides facilities for everyone to use.

In conclusion, although the policy may not compensate for all needs and creates a huge destruction to the environment, it becomes affordable to those who cannot pay for

flats in redeveloped areas. It also prevents population booming and provides many types of facilities to enhance their quality of life. As a result, alleviating the housing problem there is. Therefore, I believe that this policy helps to relieve the current housing problem.

Is the parental leave policy in Hong Kong outdated?

believe that Hong Kong's parental leave law is outdated, considering the three factors: sustainability, effectiveness and potential.

First and foremost, Hong Kong's parental leave law is not sustainable for the future because it intensifies the aging population and gender inequality problems. The inadequacy in the days of parental leave provided in Hong Kong discourages couples from having babies. The maternity leave law of 10 weeks had not been updated for 48 years until 2018. Even with recent updates to paternity leave, there lies huge differences: 5 days compared to 10 weeks, which makes it hard for young couples to have healthy family planning. Moreover, this imbalance employs a sense of gender inequity in society. It is not favorable for Hong Kong to still possess qualities of a patriarchal society. These two reasons make it not sustainable and hence outdated.

Secondly, the purpose of parental leave is an employee benefit that should improve quality of life. Judging on the policy's effectiveness in doing so, it fails to satisfy some aspects of life. There are two health concerns that are overlooked. One is the mother's likelihood to develop postpartum depression is increased with low social support. Fathers can't support mothers with the short paternity leave. Another is that the baby is highly likely not to be consistently breastfed as the months go by. This doesn't ensure the best for mothers and babies and creates health concerns that lower quality of life. The ineffectiveness of the policy as an employee benefit is exemplified. Henceforth, it is outdated as the policy is not effective as an employee benefit.

Lastly, Hong Kong's separate maternity and paternity leave policies don't fulfill much potential. When compared with other countries' policies, there are many things that Hong Kong lacks. For instance, all of the countries reviewed before having a shared parental leave program. In addition, they also have statutory rights to flexible work arrangements. In Hong Kong, some 30% of mothers, since the lack of childcare options, have hence dropped out of the workforce to tend to family responsibilities. The government's work on separate paternity and maternity leave policies when juxtaposed with other countries is perfunctory. Therefore, the law is outdated in terms of potential.

Nevertheless, some people may still argue that parental leave in Hong Kong is not outdated because small to medium-sized enterprises are in threat of economic losses. Since the scope of their businesses are very small, the policy may lead owners to lose money in the long run. Though employers are informed at least 3 months before the leave date, these businesses can't plan so extensively. It isn't feasible for them and means the policy should remain as it is and shouldn't be called outdated.

However, I still think the parental leave in Hong Kong is outdated and needs to be extended because the government can help SMEs through subsidies. In the present time, Carrie Lam's proposal of I4 weeks of maternity leave is going to be IOO% reimbursed by the government which will cost the government HK\$479 million to subsidize the employers. The government wants to fund more money on employee benefits as they too believe in its outdated quality. Therefore, I believe that the

parental leave policy is still outdated. People also argue that parental leave in Hong Kong is not outdated because quality of life is maintained with a shorter time of leave. As in parts B and C, the maximum salary per month is capped at HK\$36, 822. This means that high-earning employees with monthly salaries of HK\$50, 000 or more can't be paid more than HK\$36, 822 per month. Mothers take more than 2 months of maternity leave and so have to sacrifice their salary. Thus, quality of life is reduced in the aspect of material possessions. If the policy is extended, this increases the period of time stayed at home and hence the amount of loss of salary. Thus, the policy is not outdated.

Nevertheless, I disagree as I believe that the quality of life of the child and parents are to be considered. In Part C, there are two health concerns that arise from the current parental leave laws including the baby and mother's health. Weighing the losses in two aspects of quality of life, I believe that the future wellbeing of the baby and the postpartum health of the mother is more important. Thus, I still believe the parental leave laws of Hong Kong are outdated.

In light of the outdatedness of Hong Kong policies, some suggestions that the government can take are to firstly, implement a shared parental leave program: the developed countries in Figure 6 are some examples that Hong Kong can follow, especially Singapore. This promotes gender equality and shared parental responsibility in the society.

Secondly, they can improve on the details by including flexible work arrangements, childcare

leave services and the provision of statutory nursing breaks at the workplace. So that the policy can accommodate a diversity of people, such as single mothers raising a baby.

Thirdly, they should inspire more liberal values on the whole of Hong Kong by encouragement. For instance, in government

video advertisements and websites, they should advocate and state the importance of gender equality. This gets rid of traditional patriarchal views

For employers they can:

Lastly, they can provide a longer period of leave than required by law. This improves employee productivity, loyalty and talent as the best

employee benefits are received. At the same instance this creates an aspect of competition between other companies. This as a whole adapts everyone in Hong Kong to receive equal and adequate amounts of parental leave.

In conclusion, I believe the parental leave law is outdated in Hong Kong.

Impacts of Overuse of Antimicrobial Resistance

ne possible impact of the spread of antimicrobial resistance on quality of life is that it creates health concerns. As antimicrobials are also used in veterinary medicine, for growth promotion in animals and disease prevention in agriculture. This shows that the antimicrobials are used in various industries such as agriculture to prevent illnesses. Antimicrobial resistance would therefore create an increasing amount of diseases being spread through the agriculture industry. Many farmers and other workers would not be safe if the antimicrobials used are not effective. It can create diseases which could spread to the workers, this can then spread to other workers and people who are in contact with them. They would catch the disease and therefore have poor health. This will lead to more people being sick and being hospitalised. This has a negative impact on people's non-materialistic quality of life. This is one possible impact of the spread of antimicrobial resistance on quality of life.

A second possible impact of the spread of antimicrobial resistance on quality of life is that it can change people's mindsets. Every time an antimicrobial medicine (such as an antibiotic and antiviral) is used, it diminishes its effectiveness for all users, because its usage increases the possibility for the bacteria or viruses to become resistant to the medicine. This shows that overusing antibiotics can create drug resistance. This information creates awareness to the public and will allow them to rethink their usage of medication. This will make people think more wisely about the amount of antibiotics they take, they will listen to their doctors and take the prescribed amount instead of taking too much. This will prevent their bodies from becoming drug resistant and allows them to be helped and cured from certain illnesses and diseases, reducing the population of patients being hospitalised due to antimicrobial resistance. This brings them a healthier life and has a positive impact on their non-materialistic quality of life. This is a second possible impact of the spread of antimicrobial resistance on quality of life.

A third possible impact of the spread of antimicrobial resistance on quality of life is a decrease in the world's population. By 2050, the total death toll worldwide as the result of contracting an infection that proves resistant to the treatment is expected to reach 10 million people. This shows that antimicrobial resistance can lead to more deaths in the future. This will lead to a decrease in the world's populations and create a population gap between different generations. This leads to a negative impact on the world's long-term development as the source shows the estimated death toll by 2050, however not the years after that. This tells us that there could be a larger amount of deaths due to antimicrobial resistance. This will make the world's development suffer as there will be fewer workers and other stakeholders who are needed to progress towards the future. Effectiveness of tackling the objective of the proposal

I believe in terms of the effectiveness of the proposal, the artificial island does not exactly fulfil the concept of sustainable development

and solve the problems of the current Hong Kong economy in the short run.

One of the aims of the project is to enhance environment capacity for sustainable development. The project cannot guarantee a sustainability of development as it can create problems that future generations will suffer

from. For example, the affected ecosystem will cause the future generation to no be able to live in a habitable of healthy environment. Furthermore, the project can possibly use up larger portion of current economy's resources and thus there can be a lack of resources for the future.

Secondly, Hong Kong is facing a shortage of land supply as the demand of land is greater than the land supplied in the short run. The project will take at least 7 years excluding the possibility of delays or any obstacles that could cause the project to use a longer time. Hence due to the time needed for the project, the current generation of the Hong Kong economy will not be able to be benefited by the project in the short run.

However, the project can significantly increase the amount of land available in Hong Kong. After the completion of the project, it is estimated that 170 hectares square of land will be available. This shows that the project can achieve its main goal by increasing land supply, mostly for housing supply. Moreover it can provide up to 400 000 residential units and thus relax the tension for housing prices in Hong Kong so that more citizens can afford a home.

Social aspect

I believe in terms of the social quality of life, the society QOL cannot be completely improved as there are more than enough negative externalities to outweigh the positive externalities to the society.

Hong Kong will not be able to develop areas for major purposes such as preservations, pollution reduction or leisure development as the government will need to use a lot of time, money and effort on the artificial island development. In result Hong Kong will bear many opportunity costs if they choose to carry out the proposal. Therefore it will be irrational or inefficient for Hong Kong to develop artificial islands in the current economy as there are higher demands in other areas such as subsidizing families in need or in other words the poverty situation in Hong Kong.

At the same time, currently Hong Kong is having a lot of civil disobedience due to the

extradition bill. Hence further discussing or developing the proposal of the island would be like putting more oil onto flames as the citizens will be more angered by the government's decisions. Therefore to avoid or relax the conflict and improve the relationship between the government and citizens, it will be better to postpone or if possible withdrawn the proposal to redevelop the trust between government and citizens.

It is true that the proposal can achieve it major aim, to increase land supply, and this can improve the QOL of citizens by the increase of housing supply. However, besides the construction of the island, alternatives methods can be used to increase housing supplies. Thus the project could be unnecessary regarding that there are alternatives methods to achieve its aim and simultaneously being more social beneficial.

Economic aspect

I believe in terms of the economic quality of life, it is true that the society QOL could be improved while some externalities may exists.

Due to the construction of the island, hundreds of direct and indirect job opportunities will be created. This can increase the average income of citizens, then their consumption will increase and thus increase in Gross Domestic Product. Therefore this proves that the proposal can improve citizens' economic quality of life as their cost of living will be lowered and the general income will rise so that their living standards could be improved too.

However, the cost of the project will need the government to bear a heavy burden on their fiscal budget as the project is extremely high regardless of the possibility that it might go over budget. This shows that from the project the government can lose more than it has and in end the people suffering would be the citizens themselves. Although at the same time citizens earnings will increase and thus it could offset the financial cost that could happen to them due to the fiscal loss of the government.

Environmental aspect

I believe in terms of the environmental quality of life, the project will be detrimental to the environment of Hong Kong.

From the process of the construction, large amounts of different types of pollution will be created, air, water, sound, light, etc. This will significantly harm the stakeholders of Hong Kong in their daily lives. Pollution will also be irreversible and harm the present and future of Hong Kong, and the rest of the world through worsening global warming, climate change, rising sea levels, etc. Therefore, the project does not uphold its original value of enhancing environmental capacity for Sustainable Development as it will cause problems for the future generations.

Also, despite that the project cannot guarantee a sustainable development, the present generation will also suffer as the ecosystem and biodiversity will be deeply affected. Reclamation requires the necessity of development under the water, thus it will affect citizens under the sea such as different species of fish, and a important mention, the Chinese White Dolphin which is currently listed as a endangered species by the World Wildlife Fund Organization. Therefore the proposal does not upholds another of its aim which is to conserves while developing as it will obviously worsen the situation for the sea creatures and in result possibly break the ecosystem.

Conclusion

After processing all the effects that will be created to the Hong Kong economy, I conclude that overall the proposal is not beneficial to Hong Kong stakeholders, although Lantau Tomorrow Project can improve and create a handful of positive externalities, however it comes with another handful of negative externalities which can offset each other. Although alternative methods may take longer time or more inconvenience, but it is true that they can assure a more sustainable development as they do not do as much harm to the present and future of the Hong Kong economy and the rest of the world. Therefore the project should not be carried out.

n 2019, our school got an excellent result in the UKMT Senior Mathematical Challenge. Our students got 16 awards and 6 of them got gold certificates. 




On studying Mathematics

- 2. Do past papers. Time yourself while doing it. Speed and accuracy are the keys to success! MOVE ON to another question if you can't solve a question in 5 mins (or 2 mins for MCs). Come back to the missing questions at the end when you have time.



- 3. Get a notebook and write all the questions you got wrong in it (or cut and stick them in). Keep coming back to this notebook and try to do the questions in it without looking at the answer first, remove the question after getting it right twice. Aim to solve all questions and "empty" this book!
- 4. Write down every single step in your brain, your hand shouldn't stop when doing questions; skipping steps risk making careless mistakes.
- 5. Don't make your rough worksheet a mess, fold it 4-5 times if that helps, limit I question in I space, so when you're checking your answers, you can come back and find your thought process easily instead of having to do a question all over again!







Eventually, I got into Sports Therapy at the Technological and Higher Education Institute of Hong Kong.







Science Department

he aim of Science Department is to provide learning experiences that will enable students to develop scientific

literacy, inquiring minds and curiosity about science and the natural world so that they can participate actively in our rapidly changing

knowledge-based society, prepare for further study or a career in fields where a knowledge of science will be useful; and become life-long learners in science and technology.

Biology - Sustainable Trees Conservation Project

his year, our School joined a sustainable trees conservation project organized by Hong Kong Air Cargo Terminals Limited (HACTL). Due to limited planting space on the rooftop of SuperTerminal I, the HACTL group has kindly donated 3 Eucalyptus trees to our School.

The trees were successfully transplanted to our school campus and some of the tree debris was recycled as substrate for the growth of mushrooms, when combined with coffee grounds and other recycled materials.

A group of Biology students and junior form Science students took this opportunity to set up a mini-greenhouse in our school. They tested out the growing conditions of mushrooms using the recycled materials as substrate. Fortunately, our students managed to grow some mushrooms in the mini-greenhouse.

Overall, this was a great learning experience for our students to participate in the conservation project and to learn more about Eucalyptus trees and the growth of mushrooms. We are happy to see the Eucalyptus trees begin their second life in our school campus and hopefully the message of environmental protection and conservation will be spread among our students and the community.

International Biology Olympiad -Hong Kong Contest 2019

e are proud to share that our Biology students Chockle Cheung (6H), Amelie Verreault (6H) and Yamauchi Kahori (5H) obtained outstanding results in the International Biology Olympiad – Hong Kong Contest (IBO-HKC) 2019. They brought home the Gold Award, Honourable Mention Award, Outstanding Student Performance Award and the Best Schools Award respectively.

In addition, our Biology students were invited to the Prize-giving Ceremony organized by the Education Bureau in January 2020, and they have been selected to receive further training organized by the Hong Kong Academy for Gifted Education for International Biology Olympiad 2020 (Phase I).

The International Biology Olympiad – Hong Kong Contest (IBO-HKC) 2019 is a territory-wide competition for secondary school students co-organized by the Education Bureau (EDB) and the Hong Kong Academy for Gifted Education (HKAGE). This year, there were over 1000 top students from more than 100 Hong Kong secondary schools participating in this contest.

The competition aims at promoting Biology Education in Hong Kong and providing challenging and enriching learning opportunities for students with high potential in Biology. A series of enrichment programmes arranged by the HKAGE will be provided for the highachieving students in the IBO-HKC 2019. Students with outstanding performance in the enrichment programme might be selected to represent Hong Kong to take part in the 31st International Biology Olympiad (IBO) in July 2020. The purpose of the IBO is to enable students to apply analytical skills and creativity through tackling challenging problems in Biology and conducting



experiments. Each participating country/ region may send a team of four students for the competition.






Chemistry Corner

n 28th November, the Science Department presented a Chemistry Corner on the school campus. The Chemistry teachers prepared three Chemical tricks for students to experience. Experiential learning promotes students' interest in

learning science and helps them understand chemical principles via the participation in experiments.





Physics-Integrating STEM Elements into School Curriculum

starting from this school year, STEM activities were integrated into Physics lessons. The challenging design of the activities led to open-ended problem-solving projects. In these activities, Science is central to the integration of Engineering, Mathematics and Technology.

Students in Form 5 needed to make a device consisting of two LED point sources, and thus they designed a super-bright 3V

LED circuit. They built every component on a circuit board called a stripboard, on which there are single pole switches, double throw switches and a connector. The most exciting part is the soldering process, in which the electronic components and the stripboard are joined together by melting, which shows the maker's spirit of our students!

Students in Form 6 needed to make a Chinese scale that can measure the weight of an unknown object ranging from O to IOO grams. This group activity consolidates the concepts of moment of force through applying those concepts, and includes the Engineering design process. Our students chose chopsticks after searching for materials, and modified them by drilling holes for the string. When it was time for the measuring, it became a group competition to measure the most accurate values!





ur students in Physics class were selected to participate in the Shaw Prize Lecture on Astronomy 2019. They went to the University of Hong Kong for a lecture by Dr. Stone, the Shaw Prize winner this year in Astronomy. The objectives of this activity were to extend

students' knowledge and curiosity about Physics's daily-life application and research methodology, to expose students' to the new research frontiers of the Science community, and to enhance students' interest in studying Science by listening to a lecture delivered by one of the foremost scientists in the world.

The students learned not only scientific facts about the solar system and interstellar space, but also the way how the knowledge can be gained through the Voyager project. After the lecture, our students also had a chance to have a short chat with Prof. Kenneth Young. Students were so engaged throughout the day by the knowledge that they could understand and digest.



The 2 Model Audition Days showed a lot of enthusiasm and talent from so many students across Hong Kong that came to audition at our school.






MICRO BIT Workshop


Scouts applied tent-making and mapreading skills in a two days and one night camp on school campus, including a hike from Mui Wo to Discovery Bay in October.

These ideas relate to all our students and they reflect the generous, ambitious, empathetic and brave people that we see


them becoming. This year has given us many examples of the outstanding strength and character of our students and we are immensely proud of the efforts that you have put it.



When asked about what her most memorable YHKCC student was, she told us about a unique experience. During her Service Outreach Week (SOW) in Form 4, she went to Sichuan where she was given the opportunity to teach those who were underprivileged. She also went to the site of the 2008 earthquake, where people's homes were knocked down, furniture scattered all over the area and dismay clouds were still visible in the caliginous sky.

"It was such an eerie feeling walking alongside the wreckage created by the earthquake," she recalls. "The trip was a great opportunity for me to give back to the community and it also made me realize how fortunate I am and how grateful we should be for what we have."

Through her experiences in YHKCC, she has been able to instil valuable morals in

the students. She has always valued and enjoyed education, from her first day of school to the end of her alma mater.

As she takes a sip from her cup of gamboge coloured juice, she says the joy she received from education and learning inspired her to stay connected to education in one way or another.

Walking with me down the corridor, she talks about changes in the school; "Back then, we didn't have the Football Ditch, the Music Block or the Trinity Hall. In terms of teaching style, YHKCC places a greater significance on collaborative learning now. It encourages students to work in groups and share some news ideas. This is seen even in something as simple as the change in the classroom seating plans."

The transition from becoming a student to a teacher was a huge challenge for her. She had a strange feeling as she had to call her former teachers by their first names.

"Even though I haven't been a student in YHKCC for several years, it was weird to acknowledge that I am a teacher here now!"

As for her future, she has great plans for the impending future; "Ultimately, I would like to make an impact in the academic world, either by teaching the importance of enjoying education to the younger generation or to get a PhD and make an original contribution to knowledge."



"I had a lot of successes in YHKCC which were mainly in my extra-curricular activities. I performed as a soloist for my YHKCC Choir in the IIth Chorus Festival in Beijing. Being the chairperson of the Music Society, I also founded a singing group named 'The Trebles' since I enjoyed everything related to performing arts. We competed in various invitationals and performances."

Ms Jose also shared that she had been one of the captains of the Cheerleading Team as well as a Student Ambassador.

When asked what has changed in YHKCC since she was a student, she happily recalled her student life. It had been seven years since then which meant that there were definitely a lot of humongous

changes in YHKCC in terms of the facilities and the teaching style. The trinity hall, senior lounge, football pitch and career centre are some of the few examples of the new YHKCC facilities.

"The teaching styles are very different where the focus is more on creating a positive place for students to learn, play and enjoy. Now, we have the student wellbeing team that was rebranded from the discipline team. I think this is mainly because YHKCC is trying to put wellbeing and positive education at the forefront of learning."

Ms Jose shared some factors that encouraged her to become a teacher.

She headed the musical theatre program

for children ages four to twelve, at the studio she danced at. She also worked as an acting tutor for an intensive summer musical program in her second year of studying at the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts, preparing the children to perform a musical at the end of the course.

"Since I am a very meticulous person, I always want everything around me to be 'extra' good. When I came into this school, I put unnecessary pressure on myself which made me less confident."

However, with the constant support and guidance of her mentor, Ms Jessica Choi, she was able to realize that it is a learning experience. It's normal to fail along the way on your path of success; resilience and believing in yourself are what's really important.


"The layout of some parts of the school has changed significantly. The football pitch, the canteen area, the Student Learning Centre, the Art floor, Music Studio have been newly added to the school facilities. Certain activities for the senior forms have also increased such as the Senior Prom. I remember

fighting for that back in high school with my classmates. Yet it wasn't granted, so I had to content myself with the graduation dinner!" she laughs.

She says of her decision to become a teacher "As English is one of the languages I'm fluent in, and with my undergrad degree being in Communication, I wanted to take it further and took up my MA in English Language Arts which exposed me to English teaching — I've loved it ever since."

When asked about her achievements in YHKCC, she shares that she did not have a lot of academic achievements. She took more pleasure in her extracurricular activities such as Cheerleading. As a result, she was able to gain more recognition and awards from that sector.

"I was one of the few Phoenix Cheerleading Team members as well as the Cheerleading captain of the Morrison House," she says with a bright smile on her face



Mr William Chan has overcome quite a few challenges in his transformation from a student to a teacher at YHKCC. From his very first year in teaching, he placed high expectations of himself as a teacher. As an easily-stressed person, he found the situation was made even more stressful by the knowledge he would be working alongside many of the teachers who had taught him when he was a student.

He said "But everything turned out fine as I got used to my new identity as a teacher. The school allowed me to explore and experiment with many teaching ideas. Also, working with my own teachers actually made me get used to things more easily."

The first few months of teaching remains the most unforgettable experience in Mr Chan's life as a teacher. "I don't want to be too strict, and I don't want to be too friendly. I

still remember in my first year of teaching, I tried to create a more relaxed and fun learning environment for my senior classes in preparation for the public exams. Rapport and mutual trust were quickly built, but my seeming lack of authoritarianism would lead to some very (over)energised lessons at times. Some of my students didn't treat me as a 'teacher' but more as a teacherfriend" he reminisced. "The situation readily improved after Mr Chan set clear classroom rules to maintain order. "Thankfully, along with the rapport, mutual respect was developed as they matured to become responsible young men and women."

The balance between life and work was another paramount challenge for this dedicated teacher who began teaching on YHKCC in 2017. "I would have

to spend evenings and weekends on schoolwork when there were too many assignments to mark or nineteen things on the to-do list. Yet I would still try my best to strike a balance between work and relaxation and spend time with family and friends whenever possible."

Truly, a smooth sea never made a skilful sailor. Simply put, easy situations can never improve you or make you better. The harsh conditions of life make a person tougher and more capable.

Back when he was a high school student, Mr Chan was a prefect, a keyboardist and bassist in the school orchestra, and a student librarian. During his secondary school life, he was named "Chan sir" in Cantonese, which refers to Mr Chan. "I think this was mainly because I was a very boring person who studied a lot," he said, laughing.

Mr Pedregosa's love of Geography was his reason for becoming a teacher. He would like to inspire students to pursue this subject as their career as there aren't enough geographers in the world. He believes they are needed to solve climate change, natural disasters and urban problems such as traffic and pollution.

When asked about his time as a high school student in the YHKCC, he recollects that his experiences were vibrant and varied. He achieved many extra-curricular and academic achievements, and participated in several competitions. He won subject awards in

Music, Home Economics, Mathematics and of course, Geography!

"My favourite experience as a student was cheerleading. It felt great to be surrounded by people who had so much drive and passion to excel in the sport. Of course, it also felt great to win! Bu the time I graduated, we had won 4 times in the Islands District Cheerleading Competition and now the team have already claimed their 9th title!"

Regarding the changes in the YHKCC from the past to the present, he disclosed an interesting fact: "I found that it was challenging to introduce IT

in the classroom because my lessons back in high school barely involved any technology! The school iPads definitely make it much easier to adapt - I now enjoy using Quizizz, Google Classroom, Nearpod, etc.

Geography-loving Mr Pedregosa also shared his goals for the coming 5 years. These include studying for a postgraduate certificate in Education, learning to teach different curriculums, and pursuing a master's degree. In the long run, he is hoping to teach and conduct research in different countries!




t the age of 26, YMCA alumni Mr Mike Cadano is the coach of the school Basketball Team and teaching assistant of the Physical Education Department, When I ask him about some of the differences in the school since he was a student, he tells me "One of the biggest changes in terms of the methods of teachings is the use of technology such as using IPADs as an aid in teaching and educational apps in order to reinforce the learning of the students, much more so than when I was a student here."

He also points out some major changes in the school facilities which include the Music Block that stands at the end of the canteen area as well as the Trinity Hall which acts as a cardinal facility for the Drama students.

He notes that he faced a handful of challenges on his road to teaching.
